

DATA FOR PROGRESS

From December 22 to 29, 2022, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,189 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, geography, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 3 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

Supporters of an executive order say that President Biden can act immediately to establish a CCC in order to put young Americans to work in jobs that can address the threat of climate change and offer opportunities for young people to begin careers in public service.

Opponents of an executive order say that a CCC should only be implemented through Congress taking action to create this program and that it's better to wait for a bipartisan agreement on funding to take place than to act immediately to start a CCC.
